J. Eric Smith, Keynote Speaker at the Committee of 100 Dinner

It is an honor and a privilege to return to the Chapel + Cultural Center tonight and I am especially delighted to be here as Rick Hartt is honored as this year's Sun and Balance Award winner. Rick's work has positively touched so many people over the years, all of whom would no doubt applaud his award here. Thank you, Rick, for all you do.

I always found it aesthetically pleasing that the Chapel + Cultural Center's formal name and mark included neither the word "and" nor an ampersand, but rather a stylized symbol of the Christian Cross. I also recognize and appreciate that elegant, additive mark as a plus sign. Tonight, I would like to talk about the special power of that mathematical plus sign, and how important it is in the history and ongoing life of this campus community. First off the building itself: it is a chapel, plus it is a cultural center. In the early 1960s, as the Second Vatican Council was working to redefine the relationship between the Church and the modern world, our founding Trustees specifically worked to create a space that would satisfy the Council's most transformative spiritual aspirations. The able guidance plus hard work and belief and financial support of so many others all added up to this amazing, versatile building. We are a campus facility, plus an important part of the greater community around us. We bring many constituencies together to experience art and culture, to learn and to worship.

What about the award we're giving to Rick tonight? We call it the Sun plus Balance Award – where the Sun represents God, and the Balance represents justice. It's the pursuit of fairness anchored in the glow of something greater than ourselves that changes the world for the better, and helps us truly glimpse the divine.

We look around the room tonight and we are young plus (shall we politely say) not-so-young. That's the power of plus. The Hebrew plus Roman plus Greek letters on the floor remind us that we engage with a multiplicity of cultures. Again, the power of plus. I'm prepared to take my mathematical statement to a higher power to prove my point. What is the cornerstone axiom of this higher power math? Let me refer you to the text that surrounds the Sun and Balance logo on Rick's award: God is the Measure of All Things.

We may think we know the value of variable A, and we may think we can define the limit of curve B – but our tools for measuring such things are weak and of limited computational value. However, when we hold our viewing lenses up before the light of God's Sun, and when we weigh things in the pans of His scale, and when we open our minds and our hearts to His math, then the formula that proves the power of plus here is simple: $A + B$ is less than $C + CC$, Q.E.D.

Excerpts of remarks by Rick Hartt at the Committee of 100 Dinner

The C+CC, the Christ Sun of Justice Parish and The Rensselaer Newman Foundation; the first thing that comes to mind is you made my career, gave me my big break and the opportunity to learn and succeed. In 1972, the assistant to RPI's President, Charles Moravec, wrote in his letter of recommendation, "Ask him a question, though he may seem like he is sleeping, he really is thinking." The support of Dave Aiken and Betty and Steve Wiberley on the selection committee made it possible for me, at 24 years old, to become Director of the C+CC. The volunteers were tremendous and the students were the focus. Fast forward to the 25th anniversary celebration of the C+CC, I worked with Father Tom Phelan, the new guy, Father Ed, and Catherine Waibel. Students continue to be the focus. The dedication of volunteers never wavered. Now it has been 13 years on the Board of the Foundation with many great contributors. At the beginning AnneMarie Ferraro assured me it was a good fit; David Haviland mentored me; Jim Ljunglin passed the torch 8 years ago in the most caring way; Sharon Valiquette took the torch

4 years ago, moving us forward and today passes it on to Fran Hyde in preparation for the C+CC's 50th anniversary. The support we all receive from Mary Holbriiter, Diane Waters, and C+CC Directors, including our keynote Eric Smith and especially Father Ed is invaluable. There are so many great volunteers to name that it would take the evening and I have already exceeded my time limit. Know that you are truly appreciated.

We are unique, chartered through the State Education Department as an educational institution, similar to every school in New York State. The Foundation provides spiritual and cultural enrichment to students, faculty, staff, and alumni at Rensselaer, as well as the community around RPI, supports the Roman Catholic chaplaincy at RPI, owns and manages the C+CC as a multipurpose performing arts and spiritual space; and is the home to the Christ Sun of Justice Parish. Funding an Ethical, Moral and Spiritual Presence at RPI

At the end of each summer, when the students return to campus for a fresh start, we begin a new fiscal year at RNF. While our half million dollar operating budget is not large, the impact made in the community and on the campus of this great college is significant.

As you can see, based on what has been received in the past, it is projected that two thirds of our support will come from alumni, parents, friends, and parish. You are vital to what we are able to accomplish every day. Your involvement, by way of your philanthropy, directly impacts the spiritual and cultural growth of the outstanding students at RPI. These outcomes are accomplished through planned programs and celebration of daily Mass. But what is harder to measure is the impact of our actual physical presence of the C+CC. We are

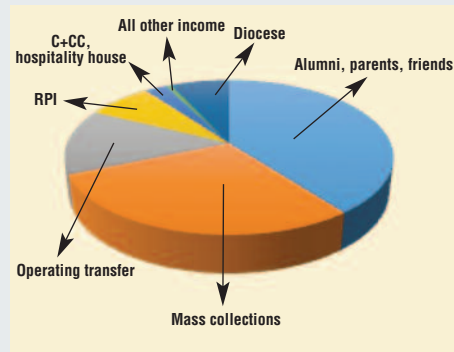
- a spiritual presence on a campus that is so focused on intellectual growth.
- an organization whose full-time responsibility is to support students ethically, morally, and spiritually.
- a body where guidance is provided for those searching to learn and understand the path of Christ.

The cost of operating our 13,000 square foot building day-to-day appears in the line labeled C+CC and program. Over the last two years, the building received many replacements and improvements triggered by use for nearly fifty years. These special capital costs were funded through a separate, successful capital campaign that began in 2012.

The Human Resources is where expenses for mission are captured. Additionally, our Director and staff are responsible for creating and managing programs and events that add to the RPI experience. Your support is allowing RNF to continue to offer students the cultural and spiritual enrichment traditionally not found in the classroom. Thank you for your part in their experience and growth.

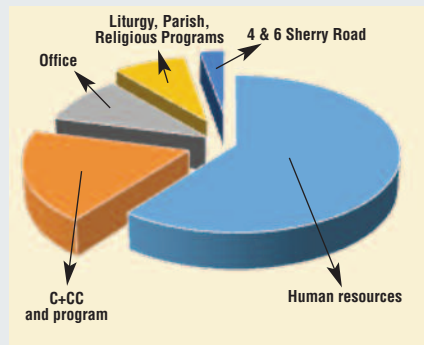

Patrick Aselin '18 attends Papal Mass in N.Y.C.

On September 25, I had the opportunity to attend the Mass for the Preservation of Peace and Justice, celebrated by His Holiness Pope Francis in New York City's Madison Square Garden.

Upon arrival in Penn Station, the magnitude of the event was immediately evident in the security presence; fully armed soldiers in battle dress patrolled the station, while above and around Madison Square Garden, security forces lined the barricades. From there, I joined the crowd heading eleven blocks and two streets away to the beginning of the line. We were all complete strangers, yet everyone welcomed each other and engaged in conversation, taking in the beautiful weather and the mounting excitement.

At around 5:00 PM and after passing through security, I finally entered the Cathedral of Madison Square Garden with its wooden ceiling, white draperies, massive crucifix, and custom altar, chair, and ambo. The stadium floor was laid out with rows of chairs facing the altar at one end, behind which were the choir and orchestra. Behind them in the lower bowl were priests and deacons whose white chasubles provided a backdrop for the Mass.


The Mass was beautiful in all respects: between the grandeur of the celebration, the music composed solely for this Mass, the excitement of the congregation, and the responsiveness to the Holy Father's every word. The meaning of "one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church" became quite tangible that evening between the attendance of the spiritual and temporal leadership of the

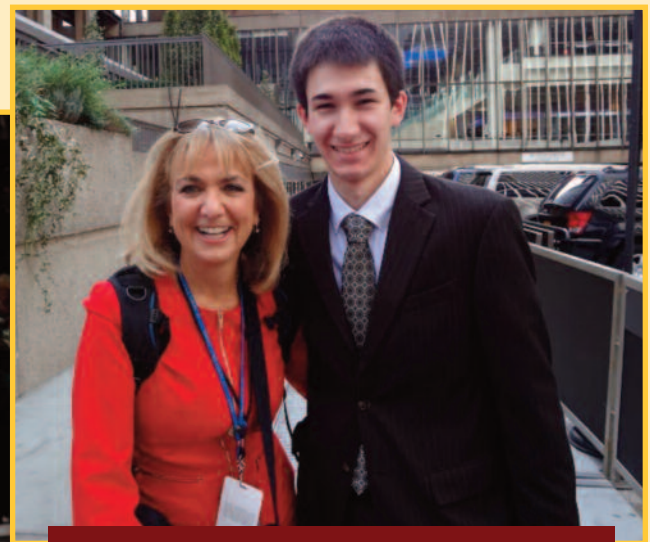
Church, as well as such a diverse assembly.

"The people who walk, breathe and live in the midst of smog, have seen a great light, have experienced a breath of fresh air."

This defined Pope Francis' homily as he praised the city's resilience and rich collection of cultures, but reminded us that such places conceal those who "don't appear to belong, or are second-class citizens...they have no 'right' to be there". He urged us to seek God within our cities, because He walks among us, and we must learn to "see" and respond to Him in those we encounter. The Holy Father's point that they are lost in the "rapid pace of change" resonates with me as an RPI student because as we advance the world, we cannot forget those who are left behind.

Cardinal Dolan's valediction distinguished this Mass from any other and revealed the spirit of those gathered. "Papa Francesco, at every single Mass, every single day, we pray for, and in union with, Francis our Pope, and now here you are", which was met with tremendous applause and a standing ovation.

The experience of seeing Pope Francis, the context of his message, being one among the nineteen thousand gathered, the venue, and the city made for truly special memories that I will always keep with me and for which I will be forever grateful.

The Jefferson Project at Lake George

It was our pleasure to have Rensselaer Professor Rick Relyea, the director of the Jefferson Project, speak at the annual McCarthy-Wiberley Town/Gown Breakfast. The Jefferson Project is a partnership between Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, IBM, and The Fund for Lake George. It combines cutting-edge technology with science to create a new model for environmental monitoring and prediction. The project is building a computer platform that captures, pools, and analyzes data from a network of sensors tracking water quality and movement. These sensor data are combined with other monitoring and experimental data to create a thorough understanding of the factors that drive the lake's food web and overall water quality. This collaborative endeavor will allow scientists to accurately predict the impact of human activities on Lake George and the approach can ultimately be applied to lakes around the world.
